Summer Academic Onboarding:

• Why we did it:

Recommendation from the Center for Student Success and Retention team to support student success. Summer and Orientation 2022- Negative, stressful.

Summer 2023 goal: Eliminate stress and complaints experienced in 2022; set up for academic success.

 How we did it: Academic Interest Survey required of all students. Consistent plan for messaging and follow-ups with students Active collaboration across schools in planning and implementing every step of the process.

"All the students are all our students."

 \circ How did it go:

85% of students submitted an Academic Interest Survey.
Process: Ability to respond to schedule irregularities
Significant reduction in stress and anxiety from students and caregivers.
Ithaca Seminars: 25% of students made specific section requests; honor
75% of them.
87% of students stayed in ICSM that was registered to them.
Learned information about tweaking the survey.
Need to communicate with internal stakeholders.
Resources for add/drop in Homer and navigate Homer in general.

Questions:

Molly: What questions were asked in the survey? Were they all academic-based? Or based on scheduled times.

Melanie: I am not sure about that. I can certainly bring that forward. Often we can try but to be real I don't think many people want 8 am so we can't leave those classes without anyone in them.

Caleb: Have you been working with the department chair on the "How-to's"

Melanie: This happens with both the departments and college-wide support and programming.

Ty: This question regards Spring registration. How is this going to go? I know it can be overwhelming with only three days of orientation for transfer students.

Melanie: There has been talk on this. Doing better with transfer students. This process is a little bit different than the fall semester. It's a challenging and different problem. But we are working on this too.

Rishabh: I have gotten feedback from my residents. Largely happy about major classes but have voiced concerns about the autonomy of the schedules. Could it be changed to a recommendation to the students?

Melanie: This is the way we think about it. This is our suggestion if you are happy, you keep it. If you want to change it here is how you change it. We are not trying to take away autonomy. For these students, I say why didn't you change the class? Maybe we can change what we call it. Maybe mentally first years do not want to change it.

Eleanor: What has your office seen in regard to this process? Now that people are here on campus looking at registration for next semester, are there any changes?

Melanie: No big changes, it's hard because we cannot do a controlled study. I was looking at midterms in comparison to this year and last year. There wasn't much of a

difference. We are trying to look at data points to see if these students are doing better. My office mostly has just gotten feedback from dean's office and the students.

Nikki: I wanted to piggyback off of Rishabh. I think one thing about first years losing autonomy is that the process of registration can be really stressful. I am a music major and have to fight for class. Therefore I love the recommended schedule idea. I appreciate it because it helps get used to registration without putting it all in at once.

Melanie: This is definitely something we have earned. We are now thinking about what is best for students and sessions that can guide them to help them change the recommended schedule. We now recognize that this would have been helpful.

Paris: Has there been additional stress for duo majors?

Melanie: I am not sure I haven't seen this case. I am not sure how it would be handled. I am sorry.

Molly: I think Homer Connect would be good to introduce to not only students but maybe even the parents. A zoom or something can be made in order for students and parents to learn this information. Also, I was wondering how these were made are there one and one or is this something just made to fit?

Melanie: In the past, there was one on-ones. Now there is not. It would cause a huge workforce in the summer. Ideally, we would love to do it. We just do not have the workforce to do this. That is why the survey was so important. We used it as guided questions.

Eva: I am a first year. I as first year thought it was set and stone and not recommended. So changing the name in Homer would be beneficial.

Carli: Creating a schedule was hard in my first year but I figured it out by looking at classes and figuring it out on my own outside of my major. I think a rundown on degree work and Homer would be very beneficial as a student.

Melanie: I think we do have modules and resources but I am not sure if they are somewhere parents can get to them or not.

Rishabh: I just had a quick suggestion. Could there be an extension to add a drop period for these first years?

Melanie: I think it goes both ways. There is a value to more time but for first-year students to come into a class several weeks late could be a burden for these students. There is a team looking at these timelines now. Something that is being looked at is a unique or different circumstance for the first years.

Nikki: I was curious about what you and the rest of the Presidential Cabinet are planning for future of IC success?

Melanie: The building of the Center for Student Success has been a big project. They are now in the tunnel. It was very purposeful making it easy to be found. Staffing has increased severalfold. There has been a challenge with the tutoring because of some transitions but the new person is there now and much better staffed than last year. The dream is to have enough staffing so that every student has a student success coach. It's a long-term goal of helping students.

Ty: Do you know what percentage those are?

Melanie: 83.something percent of students are still here from first years to graduation. We want it to be up to 90%. We feel we lose students for the wrong reason. We want to raise that up.

Ty: I am taking high level classes in my degree. We don't have tutors or TA. Is there any help there that is happening?

Melanie: It is hard to know without the details. But when those advanced classes are taken Junior and Senior. Sometimes it is hard to find people who are still here who have taken this course. What class is it?

Ty: Calculus Three.

Melanie: Wow! We should be able to find some tutors for this course. Maybe falculity aren't having tons of people asking about this course. I will investigate.

Ava: I am in the Exploring the Option class. There are YouTube videos out there. But they do need updating because they are 5 or 6 years from the past. I think updating will help.

Caleb: Point of information the video itself is not filmed very well to which makes it less accessible.

Paris: Is there specific schools struggling with high-stress rate more than another?

Melanie: No I think most of the programs at least music and theater have a rigid curriculum being pre-registered to the bulk of their classes. They are the ones we weren't seeing stress. We are hearing it more from non-needed classes unrelated to the majors. It wasn't an accident that we started it on the Exploratory. There was no guidance for these individuals. We tended to see stress where there were choices. We wanted to get rid of the anxiety to have students have something they could work off of.

Quinn: I had a question about feedback from the first years. Is there a way to get feedback from advisors and RA one-on-ones as well?

Melanie: Yes, there has been talk. All of it has been filtering up.

Molly: There are bullet lists for some majors recommending courses. Are these available for all majors? I know there is one for mine specifically.

Melanie: Many majors do this but definitely not all of them do it. There has been a lot of talk about advising. Conversation about collaborations for better advising tools for faculty. We are looking to build every faculty member an advising site. How to be better at sharing the necessary materials.
