Reflections on Gender Violence and Social Movements

A virtual event series to screen and discuss the Fundamental docu-series created by the Global Fund for Women. This event series was co-hosted by the Tompkins County Advocacy Center, BOLD Women's Leadership Network, Office of International Programs, the Center for IDEAS, the LGBT Center, Athletics, the Office of Student Engagement, Public Safety, the Politics Department, the Office of Religious and Spiritual Life, the Women's Mentoring Network, and the Psychology Department. This series allowed students, faculty, staff and community members the opportunity to reflect on the films, discuss how they relate to their own lives or communities, and think about the implications for any social movements they may be passionate about.

Bring in the Bystander

Bring in the Bystander (BITB) teaches bystanders how to safely intervene in situations where an incident may be occurring or where there may be a risk of sexual or relationship violence. This program uses a community of responsibility approach through a well-researched and tailored training program.

Consent and Pleasure

This interactive workshop explored the intersections of consent and pleasure. We discussed the ways these two components of sexual health and inform and amplify one another. All participants gained valuable knowledge and skills to apply in future relationships and sexual encounters!

The Safest Sex

Former IDEAS employee, Geselle Dominguez, discussed topics such as the stigma and myths surrounding masturbation and sex toys, and exploring the ways self-sex talk can impact our lives.
